Coalition2030's Local Election Manifesto 2024

People in Ireland are experiencing a housing crisis, broken healthcare system, increasing inequalities, climate chaos, vanishing biodiversity, and a troubling expansion of exclusionary politics. And there is virtually no incentive for politicians - local Councillors included - to take a long-term and interconnected view. Decisions are made based on what will win votes in the next election, not on how they will impact on our collective future. This is a key reason why we are experiencing so many interconnected crises, and why so many people are being left behind.

But we all want to know that not only our children – but all generations to come – can look forward to a good life. We want the people we love to be healthy and safe, with access to education and decent jobs, and a secure and affordable home. We want them to always have good food to eat, clean air to breathe and water to drink. We want to know our loved ones have the same opportunities as everyone else – that they aren't discriminated against because of their income, gender, disability, colour of their skin or any other part of their identity.

That's what the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) are all about – that political decisions take into account the needs of people today, and those of future generations too.

Governments across the world – including our Government here in Ireland and the countries of the EU – agreed to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030. But we won't meet this target unless our politicians take action for us all, now.

Achieving the SDGs requires decisions to be made with a view to how they impact on all policy areas, rather than in isolation. It requires joined-up thinking between local councils, committees and institutions. And it requires an understanding that the Goals are not just about the environment; they're about addressing every single area of policy to ensure we can build a world where everyone enjoys a decent quality of life.

To halt the growing politics of disenchantment and exclusion, elected Councillors should stand up for justice, champion the cause of the marginalised, and forge a path towards a future where every individual - both present and future - is afforded the dignity they deserve. They must commit to putting a social protection floor under everyone's feet, protecting workers' rights, reorienting local finances towards meeting the human rights of all both at home and overseas, and addressing the climate crisis and vanishing biodiversity.

These elections come at a make-or-break time for humanity. The question is, will those elected to our councils in a make-or-break period contribute to a **breakdown or breakthrough** for a better future?

Imagine the world we'd live in if the SDGs were all achieved.

That world is possible - but only with action from those we elect to power.

### Policy coherence and leadership

- Increase public awareness of the importance of Agenda 2030 and its 17 SDGs
- Link every local budget line to a corresponding SDG target and/or Wellbeing Framework indicator
- Work with the LGMA to ensure SDG training is delivered to local initiatives involved in delivering the SDGs
- Enable the PPNs, LENs, ETBs and communities to be true partners in policy design and SDG implementation
- Ensure SDG reports are developed by your Council
- Ensure all County Development Plans and LECPs are aligned to the Goals

#### Combat Poverty and Reduce Inequality SDGs 1 and 10

- Roll out adequate service provision for the furthest behind in society using the Pobal deprivation index
- Facilitate access through reasonable accommodations to further and higher education and transition to employment for persons with disabilities
- Utilise the full allocation for Traveller specific accommodation and support the development of sites for this purpose
- Fully implement the National Traveller and Roma Inclusion Strategy

## Recognise the importance of sustainable, affordable housing for all SDG 11



- · Address the disproportionate levels of homelessness amongst disabled people
- · Campaign for the free energy upgrade becomes accessible to tenants in the private rental sector
- Increase the provision of direct build social and affordable housing by Local Authorities and Approved Housing Bodies, with a specific focus on housing units offering tenants a differential rent as opposed to market based rent setting, particularly for the benefit of households on low incomes and living in poverty and those requiring special needs housing.
- · Improve access to safe and stable housing across all housing types for victims of domestic violence
- Expedite the roll-out of the National Broadband Plan, commencing with those with the largest proportion of premises dependent on it
- Improve the primary road network across the country to support the increased provision of public transport
- Invest in a deep retrofitting programme for community spaces
- Ringfence continued funding to encourage sports participation and active lifestyle programmes
- Invest in the provision and maintenance of community spaces, playgrounds, and youth centres

#### Promote and enable quality, lifelong education for all

SDG 4

- Support and prioritise children who have the most significant needs eg. those with psychosocial disabilities and intellectual disabilities, children without a functioning communication system, and children who are out of school due to complex issues
- Base services on children's needs, and not on whether a child is in a special school/at home
- Enhance community education programmes and life-long learning through the library network
- Ensure full implementation of the 'Our Public Libraries 2022' strategy and ensure that its implementation is inclusive and supportive of smaller branch libraries as a hub for local communities
- · Adopt and implement a national financial literacy strategy

- · Campaign for a domestic violence refuge in your local authority
- Campaign for an increase in refuge beds available to victims of domestic abuse
- Ensure sufficient access to reproductive healthcare services in your local area
- Support high-quality community childcare, particularly in disadvantaged areas
- · Work towards ensuring all establishments have a gender neutral bathroom

#### Address the twin climate and biodiversity crises

- Ensure all relevant staff (Biodiversity officers / Inclusion and Integration officers / Climate Action
  officers / Active travel / Climate and Local authority waters programme) receive training on the
  SDGs
- Host a public debate on annual implementation reports of each County Council on their Climate Action Plans
- · Campaign for community gardens and accessible allotments in your LA
- Campaign for a Local Community Energy Advisors in your local area to increase awareness and reach amongst hard-to-reach energy users
- Work towards a street by street comprehensive, all-of-society retrofitting programme focusing on the worst performing and social homes first
- Hold a public debate on annual implementation reports of your County Council on its Climate Action Plan
- Develop Climate Change Adaptation Strategies in each Local Authority area, with the collaborative input of local communities and Public Participation Networks, supported by dedicated sustainable funding in the medium to long-term
- Invest in programmes to rewet the boglands
